
CA Real College Survey Spring 2023 Fullerton College Results

In the Spring of 2023, Fullerton College (FC) participated in the CA Real College Survey, a state-wide survey of student's basic needs in the California Community College System. The survey was adapted from the largest national survey of basic needs amongst college students with some additions made to reflect the unique characteristics and needs of the CA Community College population.

The survey was administered online and students had the opportunity to enter a drawing for a \$250 gift card upon completing the survey. Overall, 808 valid responses were collected from FC, a response rate of 4.6%. Overall, the survey sample roughly matched the overall ethnic and age breakdown of the campus, with slightly more students choosing not to report any ethnicity or age on the survey. Females were over-represented in the survey sample (54% of responses compared to 50% of the total student body).

Survey Population Demographic Breakdown



Out of the 746 students who responded to the applicable questions, 59.1% reported experiencing at least one basic needs insecurity.

The survey considered three areas of basic needs:

Food Insecurity: defined as the limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate and safe food, or the ability to acquire such food in a socially acceptable manner.

Housing Insecurity: defined as a broad set of challenges such as the inability to pay rent or utilities, or the need to move frequently.

Homelessness: defined as not having a stable place to live. Students were identified as homeless if they responded affirmatively to a question asking if they had been homeless or if they identified living conditions that were considered signs of homelessness (e.g. couch surfing or living somewhere not meant for habitation).

Among the three types of basic needs, **FC students were most likely to experience housing insecurity**, although rates for all three types of insecurities was lower than other students in the region (Los Angeles/Orange County).

At Fullerton....

34% stated that the food that they bought didn't last and they didn't have money to get more in the last 30 days.

44% of respondents couldn't afford to eat a balanced meal in the last 30 days.

20% reported that they have been unable to pay or underpaid rent or mortgage in the last 12 months.

At Fullerton...

9% have temporarily stayed with relative, friend or couch surfing during the last 12 months.

3% have slept in a closed area/space with a roof not meant for human habitation in the 12 months.

At the beginning of the survey, students were asked to report on their grades over the past academic year, selecting whether their grades were mostly A's, B's, C's etc.

In general, the majority of respondents (49%) reported recieving mostly A's. When looking across the three basic needs, the overall grade distribution was roughly the same with students not experiencing basic needs skewing slightly more towards the upper end of the grading scale. Homelessness and food insecurity seemed to effect students grades equally with the average grade being approximately one quarter of a grade point lower for students experiencing these insecurities. Housing insecurity still had a negative effect on students grades, but at a lower rate, with the averag being closer to one fifth of a grade point lower.


While considering the data presented below, it is important to note that the self-reported grades of the survey sample does not mirror the colleges' overall grade distribution over the 22-23 school year (the tame time period that students were being asked to reflect on). At the college level, there was a much larger proportion of W's (15%) and F's (12%) awarded. Therefore, any interpretation of the results or generalizations to the population as a whole, must be done with caution.

In general, the impact of basic needs insecurity did not seem to have a large effect on student's grades. When considering this data, it is important to keep in mind that survey population's grade distribution looked markedly different than that of the college overall.



Takeaway's From Fulleton College's 2023 Real College Survey

- 1. Fullerton College students are less likely to experience basic needs insecurities than other community college students in our geographic area and across the state.
- 2. Housing insecurity is the most common basic need experienced by FC students, as was the case back in 2020 when the last assessment of students' basic needs was conducted. Nearly 70% of students experiencing housing insecurity reported that they were receiving some sort of public assistance. Given that FC, along with the vast majority of community colleges, do not offer student housing, the campus will need to conduct further inquiry on how to address this challenge.
- 3. The rate of basic needs insecurity across all three areas has decreased from 2020, with the greatest gains being made in the area of food insecurity. While we can not draw a direct correlation between data points, it is worth noting that the campus has invested significant resources in improving access to affordable and well balanced meals over the last year which has resulted in 54% of students responding that they have used Fullerton College's cafeteria in the last 12 months, and 21% responded that they used the food bank on campus.

A NOTE ON BASIC NEEDS BY SUBPOPULATIONS

Data collected from the survey allowed for disaggregated analysis by race/ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability status, and various life circumstances (military impacted, justice impacted, foster status, and single parent).

The OIE team did consider these disaggregations when compiling this report. Unfortunately, the sample size, when broken down by subgroup, was too small to make to make any generalizations.
